#### **VOLUNTEERS**





#### PARKING (VEHICLE/HORSE TRAILER/MOTORHOME)

- Due to limited power, electrical hook-ups directly at the Show Barn are not permitted. No motorhomes, trailers or vehicles with propane tanks may park within 50 feet of any building to avoid the risk of fire damage from a propane explosion.
- Parking is not allowed on any lawn areas. The fire lane (see facility map) must always be kept clear to allow for emergency vehicles in case of emergency.
- General parking for vehicles is available in front of the indoor arena or at the back on the north side of the show barn.
- Please be courteous when loading and unloading, DO NOT block the entrance to the show barn (west end) for any longer than necessary. You can also unload on the north side through the centre aisle.

#### **WASH RACKS**

Wash racks with cold running water are available on the east end of the show barn. There are wash racks in the main barn with hot and cold running water.

#### **FOOD TRUCK**

There will be a food truck on site on Saturday and Sunday.



## EC GOLD SHOW and AEF WILD ROSE PROVINCIAL CIRCUIT SHOW HORSE WELFARE


- 1. All participants shall be bound by the Horse Welfare Code of Conduct.
- 2. The inhumane treatment of an equine by any individual (competitor, owner, trainer, etc.) will not be tolerated anywhere on the grounds, under any circumstances.
- 3. Cruelty can be defined as intentionally causing pain or unnecessary discomfort to an equine. The standard by which such conduct will be measured is the determination of cruel, excessive, or inhumane treatment by a reasonable person who is informed and experienced in generally accepted equine training and procedures.
- 4. Anyone confirmed of abuse will be eliminated or disqualified and reported to the appropriate governing body.


























You must take and log the temperature of your horse twice a day while on the show grounds.

You must provide a copy of the log when requested.

You must have a copy of your vaccine certificate or exemption letter.

You must provide a copy of the certificate or letter when requested.

Horses that have exemption letters must provide a log of temperatures for the 7 days prior to the show when requested.

You must report any horse with an elevated temperature to the show office. If the show office is closed, contact the Show Manager. The show organizers and Amberlea will enact the Bio Security – Sick Horse Protocol.

Amberlea Meadows is committed to providing a safe and healthy environment for all exhibitors and their horses. All show participants are requested to practice good disease prevention practices. Travelling and showing horses are at an increased risk for spreading and contracting contagious diseases.

To provide a safe environment, the following measures must be adhered to:

- Entries that do not have proof of vaccinations (Influenza/EHV1-4) as per the Equine Vaccination Section of the prize list will not be accepted.
- All horses entering the show grounds must not have been in contact with any sick horses within the last 14 days. They must not exhibit any sign of illness.
- All horses coming on to the grounds must have a copy of valid Equine Influenza and EHV vaccinations (vaccinations must be administered within the last 6 months, but not within 7 days of arrival to the grounds). Proof of vaccination must be signed by a vet, on vet letterhead. The name on the vaccination MUST MATCH the name on the entry to be acceptable. Please have certificate records available upon request from Amberlea Meadows Staff.
- In the case of a horse that is unable to receive either of the vaccinations due to a history of adverse reactions, the exhibitor must provide a letter from the veterinarian on official letterhead stating that the horse in question cannot be vaccinated due to medical concerns. The name on the letter MUST MATCH the name on the entry to be acceptable.



Please have the letter available upon request from Amberlea Meadows Staff. Additionally, a log of temperatures taken twice daily for the seven days prior to entering the competition grounds must be available upon request from the Amberlea Staff.

- All horses on the grounds must have their temperatures taken and recorded twice daily. Please have temperature records available upon request from Amberlea Meadows Staff.
- Please avoid direct and/or indirect contact between horses, especially nose-to-nose contact.
- Competitors are required to notify the show office at the first sign of illness or elevated temperature. If the show office is closed, the show manager is to be contacted. The show organizers and Amberlea will enact the Bio Security Sick Horse Protocol to minimize the risk to other horses.



#### **EAADA Jan Simmonds Junior High Point Award** -

\$200 Prize Sponsored by Deb Meraw



Criteria: Awarded by the EAADA for the highest average of 2 scores for a Junior rider from the Sparkle & Spurs Gold Show. Scores must be from the same level and must be technical tests only. No Young horse tests. Competitors are considered a Junior if they are 18 years of age or less or, if they have turned 18 during the current competition season, they may still compete as a junior rider.

Jan was instrumental in the development of the Alberta Dressage Association. She was president of ADA for many years and a past chairperson of the ADA's annual casino fundraiser. She is also a cherished past president of the EAADA and could always be found doing multiple volunteer tasks at Edmonton dressage shows, often scribing and preparing

gift baskets for the judges. She orchestrated the club's merchandising program and, with her artistic skills, created the beautiful EAADA logo which remains a proud symbol that embodies the love Jan has for the club, and the sport she loves. She also contributed to the EAADA Newsletter and the organization of educational sessions.

She was awarded an EAADA "Lifetime Membership" for her dedication to the sport of dressage and the area group. Jan embodies the true spirit of volunteerism. Nationally, Jan managed group memberships for USDF for interested dressage people. Jan was honored by being chosen the Equestrian Canada Dressage Volunteer of the Month for June 2017. A Personal Note: Jan is also a dedicated horsewoman. In December 2016 she lost Sky, her beloved equine partner of 36 years.

#### **EAADA Award for Adult Amateurs in Memory of Karen Harries**

\$500 Prize sponsored by Wilma Jackson



Criteria: Awarded by the EAADA for the highest average of 2 scores for an Adult Amateur rider from the Sparkle & Spurs Gold Show. Scores must be from the same level and must be technical tests only. No Young horse tests.

Competitors must have the Adult Amateur designation on their Equestrian Canada Sports License to be eligible.

Karen Duncan Harries (November 16, 1953 – November 7, 2013)

Karen was born in Edmonton. In the '70s while Karen was teaching in Quebec, she decided to take riding lessons along with a friend. That triggered her lasting enthusiasm for riding. She returned to Edmonton where she taught in junior and senior high schools and began to take riding lessons at Amberlea Meadows on lesson horses.

Karen became active in the dressage world, helping with the organizing of clinics and shows, writing as a scribe for the judges, and serving for several years on the EA/ADA executive. She continued to ride horses that, were available, took lessons, and attended clinics.

Karen became a horse owner. She loved riding – it gave her the exercise she needed and freedom from the cares and stresses of life beyond the horse world. Her horses were willing and kind but unfortunately each one developed medical issues.

In 2013, while riding her own new mare, Karen succumbed to injuries sustained while enjoying her favorite pastime.

#### EAADA Open Award in Memory of Colin Crone - \$125 Prize



Criteria: Awarded by EAADA for the highest average of 2 scores for an Open rider from the Sparkle & Spurs Gold Show. Scores must be from the same level and must be technical tests only. No Young horse tests.

**Colin Crone** (July 1, 1933 – July 3, 2008)

In 1988, Colin bought Killerney Farms (formerly Tom Budd's, Abbey Stables and Hubbard Stables) and combined the stable and his construction company into Killerney Group.

Shortly afterwards, Colin entered the dressage scene, donating his facility for his first EAADA Wild Rose Schooling Show on July 7, 1990, (20 horses entered) and he continued to do so almost every year until 2008. In December 1990, he reported to the EAADA executive the progress of meetings planning the fate of the Whitemud Equine Centre. In 1991 he put on his first Killerney Stables Dressage Show.

Colin made a lasting impact with our dressage community and that is why the Edmonton Area Alberta Dressage Association continues to honor his memory and dedication to the sport of dressage.

You must take and log the temperature of your horse twice a day while on the show grounds.

You must provide a copy of the log when requested.

You must have a copy of your vaccine certificate or exemption letter.

You must provide a copy of the certificate or letter when requested.

Horses that have exemption letters must provide a log of temperatures for the 7 days prior to the show when requested.

You must report any horse with an elevated temperature to the show office. If the show office is closed, contact the Show Manager. The show organizers and Amberlea will enact the Bio Security – Sick Horse Protocol.

#### **Heat Stress in Equines**

The most important means of dissipating heat for a horse is the evaporation of sweat. Therefore, humidity can become a more significant consideration than temperature.

#### Prevention of heat stress/stroke:

- Pre-cool equines by hosing them to lower demands on the equine's cooling systems while they work.
- Abbreviate warm-up times.

- After exercise, cool the equine by hosing with cold water, place in shaded area, use fans on the equine,
- Encourage hydration of the equine with cool, clean water and electrolytes.

#### Signs of equine heat stress/stroke may include the following:

- High Temperature 41-43C (105-107F)
- Rapid breathing/rapid pulse
- Stumbling, weakness, depression
- Refusal to eat or work
- Dry skin and dehydration.
- In severe cases, an equine may collapse or go into convulsions or a coma

#### Treatment for heat stress/stroke:

- Call a veterinarian
- Run cold water over the entire body of the equine. May need to be hosed with 2 hoses for 20 to minutes.
- Place the equine in the shade, preferably in a grassy area and not on pavement or dark-coloured ground.
- If there is no breeze, use a fan
- Allow the equine to drink water to offset dehydration.
- Electrolytes may also be given orally.

#### Air Quality and Equines

Competitors should monitor their equines closely and retire from competition if symptoms of respiratory distress occur. This is particularly competitors with high-risk equines. High-risk equines include older and younger equines and equines with pre-existing respiratory conditions.

#### **Common Signs of Respiratory Distress**

- Respiratory rate remaining over 30 breaths per minute at rest (normal rate is 12-20 per minute).
- Shortness of breath with possible wheezing sounds.
- Nostrils obviously flaring and anxious expression.
- Very labored breathing with exaggerated movement of chest wall and flanks.
- Possible repetitive, deep cough.
- Possible nasal discharge.

Call the on-call vet if you suspect an equine is experiencing respiratory distress. Or their own vet.

#### EC STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES - HORSE WELFARE (from the EC Code of Conduct and Ethics)

EC requires adherence to humane treatment of horses in all activities under its jurisdiction. All participants shall be bound by the Horse Welfare Code of Conduct. EC is committed to:

- upholding the welfare of the horse, regardless of monetary value, as a primary consideration in all activities;
- requiring that horses be treated with kindness, respect, and the compassion that they deserve, and that they never be subjected to maltreatment.
- ensuring that owners, trainers, and exhibitors and their agents exercise appropriate care and responsibility
  in the handling, treatment, and transportation of their horses, as well as horses placed in their care for any
  purpose;
- providing for the continuous wellbeing of the horse by encouraging routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals and competition officials to achieve the highest possible standards of nutrition, health, comfort, and safety;
- continuing to support scientific studies on equine health and welfare;
- requiring owners, trainers, and exhibitors to know and follow their sanctioning organization's rules, and to work within industry regulations in all equestrian competitions; and,
- reviewing, revising, and developing competition rules and regulations that protect the welfare of the horse.

#### **AEF WILD ROSE PROVINCIAL CIRCUIT SHOW**

- The 2025 Sparkle & Spurs AEF Wild Rose Provincial Circuit Show is sanctioned as an Alberta Equestrian Federation Wild Rose Provincial Circuit competition of Alberta Equestrian Federation and will be run in accordance to the AEF Wild Rose Competition Rulebook.

- The competition is required to ensure all athletes, owners, lessees and person(s) responsible for an entry hold a current AEF membership to ensure each entry is protected by their own individual liability coverage.

Exceptions: Out-Of-Province competitors are not required to hold AEF membership provided they are members of their respective PTSO and are in good standing. A parent or guardian are not required to have an AEF membership if signing as the person(s) responsible for an entry that is a minor/junior competitor.

#### **AEF WILD ROSE SCHOOLING SHOW**

- The 2025 Sparkle & Spurs AEF Wild Rose Schooling Show is sanctioned as an Alberta Equestrian Federation Wild Rose schooling competition of Alberta Equestrian Federation and will be run in accordance to the AEF Wild Rose Competition Rulebook.

#### **AEF WILD ROSE SCHOOLING SHOW RULES**

- All athletes, regardless of age or level of competition, must wear properly fitted and fastened safety approved protective headgear including a chin strap (specified for equestrian sports) at all times when mounted. Protective headgear must be certified under one of the following standards: ASTM (American Society for Testing Materials)/SEI (Safety Equipment Institute, Inc.); BSI/BS EN (British Standards Institution); EN (European Union Standards); AS/NZS (Australian/New Zealand Standards); or CE VG1 01.040 2014-12 (provided they are BSI Kitemarked).
- Exhibitors must be ready to compete when scheduled.
- It is compulsory for the horse's assigned competition number to be worn by the horse or rider/handler when the horse is outside the stall from the time that the number is issued until the end of the competition so that officials can identify the horse. Exception: Horses stabled permanently on the competition site are exempt unless competing. Failure to display this number will incur a warning for the first offence and, in the case of second or subsequent offences, possible elimination or disqualification at the discretion of the ground jury.
- Test readers are allowed. You must provide your own reader.
- Riders are responsible for providing their own numbers (i.e.: use their own bridle numbers).
- Competitors are responsible for checking their ride times as they may change.
- Open fires are not allowed on the grounds.
- Photography. We have an official show photographer. If you wish to photo/video a specific ride, please be courteous to our official photographer and do not stand in front of them.
- Do not ride or graze your horse on the front lawn.
- Dogs must be kept on leash, please pick up after your dog.
- Horses exhibiting heat stress are to be given priority to the wash bays for cooling purposes.
- Everyone entering or exiting the stabling areas must use hand sanitizers. Either those provided or their own.

#### **EQUESTRIAN CANADA BIOSECURITY REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL COMPETITORS**

- Stall Labels must be completed for each horse, including the horse name and 24-hour emergency contact information, and placed on the horse's stall door.
- You must check your horse's temperature twice a day and record it on the Horse Temperature Chart. A normal horse temperature is between 37.2 38.3° C. Any temperature over 38.8° C (102° F) must be reported to the horse show office and/or horse show veterinarian.
- Do not share feed/water containers or buckets between horses and do not use communal water troughs. While filling a bucket, do not let the hose end touch the bucket or the water in a bucket.
- Sharing tack and equipment puts horses at risk and is not recommended. If tack/equipment must be used by multiple horses, be sure to clean/disinfect it between uses by different horses.
- Observe good hygiene around all horses on the grounds, and especially after handling a teammate's horse prior to touching your horse.
- Wash hands immediately with soap and water, or use disinfectant hand solution after handling horses, especially after contact with the mouth, nose or feces.
- Hand sanitizers are available. Please use them and indicate the importance of their use to your friends, family and casual visitors.
- All stalls have been cleaned of all manure and bedding, and disinfected. Feel free to sanitize your assigned stall prior to bringing your horse in.
- Do not allow nose-to-nose contact between horses.
- Do not permit your horse to lick or sniff surfaces in common areas. If this does occur, please use a disinfectant wipe on the area.
- If sharing a wheelbarrow, please do not bring it into your horse's stall. Leave it in the aisle.
- Please dispose of manure in designated areas only. Do not put trash in manure pile.
- If your horse develops a fever or signs of illness, contact the show veterinarian or steward immediately.
- Following the competition, it is recommended that all horses be isolated at their home facility for 21 days prior to reintroduction to other horses. If this is not possible, be sure to observe all horses carefully for 21 days.
- Following the competition, all horses should have temperatures taken twice a day for four days, and be observed for abnormal behavior and signs of cough, nasal discharge, discomfort or lameness.
